District Councillor's Report November 2022 to Parish Councils (Cllr. Diana Garrod - Bumpstead Ward)

Temporary Traffic Regulation Orders

Intended closure of Hill Lane, Sturmer Road. Due to commence on 9th December 2022 for 5 days whilst Gigaclear Ltd undertakes network repair.

Intended cosure of North Street, Steeple Bumpstead. Due to commence on 18th December 2022 for 6 hours whilst Openreach undertakes overhead and underground cabling.

The bridge at Poole Street, Gt. Yeldham A1017 – works are expected to continue until 23 March 2023. *Whilst outside the Braintree District, the roadworks map indicates a road closure with diversion on the B1054 (Hempstead) 9-11th November whilst Affinity Water undertakes works.

Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces Funding Applications Now Open

Free money to keep warm, socialise and have some fun! This funding, through Essex County Council totals £100.000 for grants of up to £1,000 to support the provision of Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces and activities for local communities in Essex. These can be the creation of new spaces and activities or to support existing ones. Open to a variety of groups; registered charities, unincorporated clubs or associations, small community groups, etc. Projects should be delivered and all funds spent by 31st March 2023. Homes for Ukraine Update

Braintree District has over 200 Ukrainian guests staying with 90 sponsors, and many of these guests are coming to the end of their initial 6 month stay with their sponsor. BDC are managing the rematching of guests who need new homes with new sponsors and so are actively looking for new sponsors. Anybody who might be interested should contact Community Services. Garden Waste Collection

The garden waste collection is suspended during the winter months. The last collection this year is 21st November. It is scheduled to resume on 27th February 2023.

Defibrillator Grants – London Hearts

Grants are available to fund Public Access Defibrillators in communities all over the country. London Hearts is a charity aiming to help and support communities with the provision of heart defibrillators and teaching CPR/defibrillator skills. They can provide a grant of £300 towards the cost of a defibrillator and storage as well as a free online training video:- https://londonhearts.org/

Share Your Views on Healthcare

The local NHS is asking people for their comments about proposals to offer fairer access to six healthcare services in mid and south Essex. In July 2022, a change in the law created a new organisation, NHS Mid and South Essex, to take over local healthcare planning from the five former clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) serving the area. These five organisations had been responsible for planning, buying and monitoring most local health services. While the majority of their policies were similar, six services had marked differences:

- Weight loss surgery (bariatric surgery)
- Correction for uneven breasts (breast asymmetry)
- Breast reduction
- Female sterilisation
- Vasectomy (male sterilisation)
- Special fertility services (intrauterine insemination or IUI for short, sperm and egg donation, and invitro fertilisation, usually called IVF)

Clinical experts in our area have looked at the latest evidence and practice for all six of these services, both nationally and locally, to ensure the local offer is high quality and safe. NHS Mid and South Essex has already

met members of the groups most impacted by the proposals to seek advice on how best to shape the proposals. Dr Ronan Fenton, Medical Director for the Mid and South Essex Integrated Care System, said, "To provide equitable access to services across mid and south Essex, we want a single policy for each one. "This is important as some residents within our health and care system currently don't have the same access to these services as their neighbours do. The proposed changes to the services will correct that.

"We want to hear what our residents think of the plans so we can ensure we're treating everyone fairly." The consultation runs from 31 October 2022 until 19 December 2022:-

APPENDIX D

This statement is fully supported by Sturmer Parish Council and forms part of its comments on the related Scoping Opinion, as reported in its minutes of 29 November 2022

28 November 2022

Dear Sir

Rowley Hill Solar - Land west of Hill Lane, Sturmer, Braintree - Consultation

I am writing on behalf of Sturmer Flood Action Group.

We were formed in 2014 (after a serious flood in the village) to help alleviate flooding and look at other environmental issues.

We have some questions about the development of a solar farm off Hill Lane as follows:

- 1. Which way would the panels face?
- 2. How do the panels affect drainage when rain lands on them instead of on soil or crops? Does more water flood off the land? If so what arrangements are made to alleviate flooding?
- 3. Hill Lane already floods badly particularly near the track for Walton Farm and the surface is badly damaged by flooding. This is inconvenient for residents of Sturmer using Hill Lane in vehicles and for walkers in the area. Part of the site falls towards Hill Lane. If panels are facing south towards Hill Lane would this make the flooding here worse?
- 4. The other side of the site falls towards the track proposed for the use of construction vehicles. A ditch runs near this track and water then flows past the lake at Sturmer Hall to the Baulk opposite the Red Lion pub. Essex County Council has installed woody dams in the ditch to hold back flood water to the main road A1017 and the ditch by the pub which flows across gardens in The Street (causing flooding regularly) and eventually to a part blocked bridge over the Stour Brook in Water Lane. Seventeen houses in The Street have been flooded internally previously and gardens and outhouses are regularly flooded by the Brook and Highways water. Would the panels increase flood water to this area?
- 5. Would the track for construction vehicles be surfaced? Would this be restored to a more rural appearance after the works? How would lorries be prevented from using an easier route to the

construction site via the A1017 (through Sturmer – with noise and nuisance to residents) and Hill Lane or via The Endway at Steeple Bumpstead?

- 6. How will wildlife on the site be affected? Will wildlife corridors be provided?
- 7. Will the site be screened as it will spoil a pleasant view for residents and walkers?
- 8. How will the panels be disposed of at the end of their useful life?

I hope you can provide a response to these queries.

Which, if any, partners does your Parish Council work with to undertake litter management activities? *Local organisations e.g: Village Hall Committee and W.I*

What past/current successes have there been with managing litter in your area? (e.g. any past successful campaigns that you could provide details on, any volunteer groups, etc) There are no dedicated litter picking volunteer groups. A date is advertised and local volunteers participate.

Are there any challenges associated with managing litter in your area? *Challenges are local fast-food restaurants.*

Going forward, how do you think coordinated working between Parish/Town Councils with the District Council could be improved in order to deter and manage littering in future? 1. A bin located at a lay-by in Sturmer would be helpful. Where people can drive up and drop it in without getting out of their car.

2. The 'Littering is illegal signs' displayed in Sturmer; near the Haverhill bypass roundabout on the A1017 was helpful and we would like to see this again.

3. The concept that that it is acceptable to litter a village when it looks unloved by its governing councils. Generally, the village now looks unkempt due to the pavements crumbling and weeds growing along its edge and in the cracks, potholes which go unrepaired for several months and sometimes years, broken signs left unrepaired, long grass and hedges overhanging. It is known that speeding and littering is reduced when a village appears attractive. However, with Sturmer situated along an 'A' road, residents are dependent on their District and County Councils to undertake this maintenance. On the whole residents feel let down; given the Council Tax that is paid to these authorities.

APPENDIX F

SFAG November 2022 update

Red Lion Flooding:

Glenn Shaw from Essex Flood Team inspected the area and agreed to ask Highways to clear the culvert under the road;

Flooding in gardens in area of The Gables:

Glenn Shaw agreed to send a letter to residents reminding them that they are responsible for keeping the ditch in their gardens clear and Alan cleared the ditch this runs into by the amenity walk.

Universities:

Representatives of University of East London, UCL and Kansai (Japan) University came to Sturmer in November to interview members of the flood action group, residents and an academic from Anglia Ruskin University.

They are researching how best to inform people of flood prevention measures.

As a result:

At the suggestion of a resident, I have set up a texting group for residents for local information on flooding.

We looked at the Emergency Plan and noted that the flood action group is expected to implement this in the event of flooding (Appendix D). We hope the PC will revise this as we are all likely to be subject to flooding if there is a serious event and would not be able to do this;

In addition, I contacted the Corporate Resilience Officer at Braintree District Council to find out her list of emergency rest centres. Some of these would be flooded or access to them would be although flooding isn't the only emergency covered by the Plan;

We renewed our informal agreement with Daniel Hannan of Sturmer Hall to use his venue as a rest centre if people are forced from their homes by flooding;

In addition, residents spoken to for the Red Lion and Gables Flooding and University interviews are once again complaining about speeding. I have asked for posters from Community Speedwatch to be placed in the Sturmer Village News and I have put some up in the village. A few people seem willing to take part but lack a leader. Janet Willey of CSW has offered to be a contact.

Solar Farm off Hill Lane:

We received postcards about this and when the online consultation is available we will make some comments. Initially, we wonder how drainage will be affected when rain falls on solid panels rather than soil or crops.
